

The Solemn Intercessions


As at Sunday liturgy, the Liturgy of the Word concludes with prayers of intercession. Today these prayers take a more solemn form as the church lifts up to God its own needs and those of the world

The Adoration of the Holy Cross

The Cross is brought into Church for the Veneration.

Three times it is shown to the people, and a refrain is sung.

Once it is placed at the front of Church, all are invited to approach the cross for adoration. A simple genuflection, a kiss, an embrace or any other sign of reverence is appropriate.



The Reproaches


My people, what have I done to you? Or how have I grieved you? Answer me! Because I led you out of the land of Egypt, you have prepared a Cross for your Savior. Hagios o Theos, Holy is God, Hagios Ischyros, Holy and Might Hagios Athanatos, eleison himas. Holy and Immortal One, have mercy on us.

Because I led you out through the desert forty years, and fed you with manna and brought you into a land of plenty, you have prepared a Cross for your Savior. Hagios...

What more should I have done for you and have not done? Indeed, I planted you as my most beautiful and chosen vine, and you have turned very bitter to me, for in my thirst you gave me vinegar to drink, and with a lance you pierced your Savior's side. Hagios...

Faithful Cross Hymn for the Adoration of the Holy Cross


The first refrain is sung in its entirety by cantor or choir and repeated by all. Refrain Part I (sung after odd-numbered verses)




- 1.Sing, my tongue, in exultation Of our banner and device!Make a solemn proclamation Of a triumph and its price;How the Savior of creation Conquered by his sacrifice! (*Ref. 1*)
- 3. Thus the tempter was outwitted By a wisdom deeper still: Remedy and ailment fitted, Means to cure and means to kill; That the world might be acquitted, Christ would do his Father's will. (*Ref. 1*)
- 5. Hear a tiny baby crying, Founder of the seas and strands;See his virgin Mother tying Cloth around his feet and hands;Find him in a manger lying Thightly wrapped in swaddling bands! (*Ref. 1*)
- 7. No disgrace was too abhorrent: Nailed and mocked and parched he died;Blood and water, double warrant, Issue from his wounded side,Washing in a mighty torrent Earth and stars and oceantide. (*Ref. 1*)
- 9. Noblest tree of all created, Richly jeweled and embossed: Post by Lamb's blood consecrated; Spar that saves the tempest-tossed; Scaffold-beam which, elevated, Carries what the world has cost!

Prayer Over the People

There is no concluding rite or dismissal, for the church continues to be at prayer throughout the Triduum

"...the paschal fast must be kept sacred. It should be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday, and where possible should be prolonged throughout Holy Saturday so that the faithful may attain the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection with uplifted and responsive minds."
